Good morning, my name is Livia Whisenhunt, CEO of PS Energy, and I will be your Master of Ceremonies.

On behalf of PS Energy, Clean Energy, and Atlanta Clean Cities, welcome to the Lithonia Unattended Fuel Outlet, affectionately known as UFO™ #7. This morning, we celebrate the Grand Opening of the first public access CNG station in Dekalb County.

I want to thank everyone for joining us, with special thanks to our legislators and government representatives. With us today are Senator Ross Tollison and Representative Don Parsons, and Commissioners Jeff Radar and Doug Everetts.

This event represents some milestones for me, personally, and for PS Energy. 30-plus years ago, I opened my first business three miles down this street - a convenience store and gas station. 20 years ago, almost exactly, utilizing the Atlanta Gas Light V-52 experimentation CNG rate, we added CNG to our downtown UFO on Whitehall Street.

The fact that, after 20 years we are building our second CNG station, is a testament to the esprit de corps shared by those that know of the economic and environmental advantages of this amazing resource, as well as a bright line indicator that here, in Atlanta, the Transportation and Economic HUB of the South, more effort – more money – more motivation – and more education are needed to bring us from a second station in 20 years up to par with the 31% growth rate of CNG use for vehicles globally.

To that end, those of you who have known PS Energy for many years know that, while rich with tenacity, ideas and efforts, like many small businesses, we are limited financially – and that is also why today is very special.

We wouldn't be here this morning if not for the efforts of Atlanta Clean Cities and the Petroleum Reduction Program, and we certainly would not be opening a facility of this caliber without the additionally financial resource and industry knowledge provided by Clean Energy.

So, everyone, please share with your constituents, viewers, readers, and customers that what is being celebrated this morning is the congruity of small business, big business, and government working together to develop lasting competitive CNG infrastructure solutions, utilizing a risk reward profile that will ensure that only viable and meaningful projects are pursued, while not putting any single consumer group, business or government entity at risk.
